

The next January, he started at Slippery Rock University where he completed a Bachelor's in Physics and a Master's in Education; while he was attending the university, he served in the Marine Corps Reverse as a Motor Transport Operator.

After he graduated from Slippery Rock University, he moved to North Carolina where he started teaching in a classroom right away. While teaching in North Carolina for 8 years he taught Earth Science, Astronomy, Physical Science, Honors Physics, and AP Physics. In addition to teaching he also coached wrestling. He is interested in how and why things work the way that they do, that is why he got into teaching physics. It is hard for him to decide what concept is his favorite. Schedule change craze

One of the major changes for this year is no more homeroom and an earlier start time. Students are to be in school by 7:20, as that is when the doors lock, and they head straight to first period which starts at 7:23. In years past, clubs and meetings would happen during homeroom. Since students no longer have homeroom, clubs are forced to have meetings before school starts or after it ends. South Park junior, Savannah Booth, states "I can't participate in all my previous clubs because I don't have a homeroom." Interact club now begins at 7:15 and of the students surveyed, more than half of the students get here after the meeting starts. South Park teacher and Interact sponsor, Mrs. Surovchak states "Interact meetings starting before school is difficult since students have to come in early." She goes on to say, "Students have done a great job at trying to get here early, but often students are still coming in after the meeting starts." Even though this situation is not ideal, students are making the best of this new adjustment and doing what they can to get to meetings in a timely manner and to get into class on time.

Another very notable change is that there are now 11 periods in a day instead of nine. For most students, they have an 11th period study hall which has its own benefits and downfalls. Since most students have study halls at the same time, they can get help from teachers during 11th period if the teacher has a prep period or a study hall class. Also, we can have assemblies, pep rallies, tutoring opportunities, activity fairs, and more during 11th period without students having to miss class. However, that comes with a problem. Steel Center students leave during seventh period, so they miss out on opportunities that they would be able to get in years past. Over the summer, there was a petition going around as soon as the idea of a new schedule came out. Students were not happy with what they heard and started up the petition. The petition got the correct amount of signatures to get the petition noticed, however students can only do so much. However, some students do not have

an opinion one way or another. South Park junior, Dominic Sprouse, states, "I don't have a general opinion on the schedule change. I don't find it good or bad. I just go through my day and don't think about it." Even though you can't make everyone happy, some students have adjusted just fine.

Although this schedule isn't loved among students and teachers, there were reasons for why this change came about. South Park High School Principal, Mr. Dellarose administered the change to extend instructional time throughout the day. He eliminated the 3 minute switch time between homeroom and first period by taking away homeroom and going immediately into first period. Mr. Dellarose stated, "The purpose of the 11th period study hall was to assist students who had to leave for sports and activities." As he stated, 11th period study hall is for students in sports and activities. He has gotten positive feedback from parents and students because they don't have to miss class when they have to leave for their specific sport or activity. However, as stated before, Steel Center students are missing out on opportunities that take place during 11th period. Even though it is just a study hall period, a lot of things happen during that time that students don't want to miss.

Even though our schedule will not change back this year and who knows what will happen next year, we will make the best of what we can and get through the 2023-2024 school year together!
